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PREFACE

It is not the intention of this manual to hold anything new for the top flight general construction estimator whose ability, know-how and knowledge in the Industry is the product of many years of schooling, actual competitive bidding, hard knocks and time-consuming analyses of both good and bad estimates. This type of estimator knows that to prepare an accurate labor estimate in dollar value one must first have a basis or reason for the use of monetary units.

Simply to say that a unit or block of work is worth so many dollars because it cost your company that on a previous project is absurd, ridiculous and tends to show the weakness of the inexperienced estimator. The purpose of this manual is to offer assistance or a basis, in direct labor manhours, for this type estimator.

The following direct labor manhours, or in some cases, comparison percentages, are the product of obtaining many hundreds of time and methods and preplanned studies, coupled with actual cost of various operations both in the field and fabricating shops, on many varied types of large commercial and industrial projects throughout the country, ranging in cost from \$10,000 to \$100,000,000.

After careful analysis of these reports we found that a productivity of seventy (70) percent was a fair average for all crafts with the exception of brick masons whose productivity was equal to only fifty-five (55) percent. The direct labor manhour tables throughout this manual are based on these percentages.

We do not attempt to define construction items or supply description or directions as to how a take-off should be made, or what quantity or quality of material make up a unit or block of work or how a particular unit or block of work should be constructed. Before anyone engaged in construction work becomes an estimator, even inexperienced, he must have some knowledge of this.

Neither will you find any cost as to materials, equipment usage, warehousing, and storage, fabricating shop set-up or overhead. If a material take-off is available this cost can be obtained, at current prices, from vendors who are to furnish the materials. Warehousing and storage, fabricating shop set-up, equipment usage and overhead can readily be obtained by a good estimator who can visualize and consider the job schedule size and location. These are items which can and must be considered for the individual project.

Before an attempt is made to apply the following direct labor manhour tables we caution the estimator to be thoroughly familiar with the introduction on the following pages entitled "Production and Composite Rate", which is the answer to this type of estimating.

INTRODUCTION

Production and Composite Rate

Here is the switch that will turn on the light and show the way to correct application of the many manhour tables that follow.

There should be sound reasoning and understanding to back up a monetary unit before it is applied to an item for labor value. The best reasoning that we know is manhours based on what we call productivity efficiency coupled with production elements.

After comparison of many projects, constructed under varied conditions, we have found that production elements can be grouped into six different classifications and that production percentages can be classified into five different categories.

The six different classifications of production elements are:

1. GENERAL ECONOMY
2. PROJECT SUPERVISION
3. LABOR RELATIONS
4. JOB CONDITIONS
5. EQUIPMENT
6. WEATHER

The five ranges of productivity efficiency percentages are:

<u>Type</u>	<u>Percentage Range</u>
1. Very low	10 through 40
2. Low	41 through 60
3. Average	61 through 80
4. Very good	81 through 90
5. Excellent	91 through 100

Since there is such a wide range between the productivity percentages, let us attempt to evaluate each of the six elements, giving an example with each, and see just how a true productivity percentage can be obtained.

1. **GENERAL ECONOMY:** This is nothing more than the state of the nation or area in which your project is to be constructed. The things that should be reviewed and evaluated under this category are:

- a. Business trends and outlooks
- b. Construction volume
- c. The employment situation

Let us assume that after giving due consideration to these items you find them to be very good or excellent. This sounds good, but actually it means that your productivity range will be very low. This is due to the fact that with business being excellent the top supervision and craftsmen will be mostly employed and all that you will have to draw from will be inexperienced personnel. Because of this, in all probability, it will tend to create bad relationship between Owner representatives, Contract supervision, and the various craftsmen, thus making very unfavorable job conditions. On the other hand, after giving consideration to this element you may find the general economy to be of a fairly good average. Should this be the case, you should find that productivity efficiency tends to rise. This is due to the fact that under normal conditions there are enough good supervisors and craftsmen to go around, they are satisfied, thus creating good job conditions and understanding for all concerned. We have found, in the past, that general economy of the nation or area where your project is to be constructed, sets off a chain reaction to the other five elements. We, therefore, suggest that very careful consideration be given this item.

As an example, to show how a final productivity efficiency percentage can be arrived at, let us say that we are estimating a project in a given area and after careful consideration of this element, we find it to be of a high average. Since it is of a high average, but by no means excellent, we estimate our productivity percentage at seventy-five (75) percent.

2. **PROJECT SUPERVISION:** What is the calibre of your supervision? Are they well-seasoned and experienced? What can you afford to pay them? What supply do you have to draw from? Things that should be looked at and evaluated under this element are:

- a. Experience
- b. Supply
- c. Pay

Like general economy this too must be carefully analyzed. If business is normal, in all probability, you will be able to obtain good supervision, but if

business is excellent the chances are that you will have a poor lot to draw from. Should the contractor try to cut overhead by the use of cheap supervision he will usually wind up doing a very poor job. This usually results in a dissatisfied client, a loss of profit, and a loss of future work. This, like the attachment of the fee for a project, is a problem over which the estimator has no control. It must be left to Management. All the estimator can do is to evaluate and estimate his project accordingly.

To follow through with our example, after careful analysis of the three (3) items listed under this element, let us say that we have found our supervision will be normal for the project involved and we arrive at an estimated productivity rate of seventy (70) percent.

3. LABOR CONDITIONS: Does your organization possess a good labor relations man? Are there experienced first class satisfied craftsmen in the area where your project is to be located? Like project supervision, things that should be analyzed under this element are:

- a. Experience
- b. Supply
- c. Pay

A check in the general area where your project is to be located should be made to determine if the proper experienced craftsmen are available locally, or will you have to rely on travelers to fill your needs. Can and will your organization pay the prevailing wage rates?

For our example, let us say that for our project we have found our labor relations to be fair but feel that they could be a little better and that we will have to rely partially on travelers. Since this is the case, we arrive at an efficiency rating of sixty-five (65) percent for this element.

4. JOB CONDITIONS: What is the scope of your project and just what work is involved in the job? Will the schedule be tight and hard to meet, or will you have ample time to complete the project? What kind of shape or condition is the site in? Is it low and mucky and hard to drain, or is it high and dry and easy to drain? Will you be working around a plant already in production? Will there be tie-ins, making it necessary to shut down various systems of the plant? What will be the relationship between production personnel and construction personnel? Will most of your operations be manual, or mechanized? What kind of material procurement will you have? There are many items that could be considered here, dependent on the project; however, we feel that the most important items that should be analyzed under this element are as follows:

- a. Scope of work
- b. Site conditions
- c. Material procurement
- d. Manual and mechanized operations

By a site visitation and discussion with Owner representatives, coupled with careful study and analysis of the plans and specifications, you should be able to correctly estimate a productivity percentage for this item.

For our example, let us say that the project we are estimating is a completely new plant and that we have ample time to complete the project but the site location is low and muddy. Therefore, after evaluation we estimate a productivity rating of only sixty (60) percent.

5. **EQUIPMENT**: Do you have ample equipment to complete your project? Just what kind of shape is it in and will you have good maintenance and repair help? The main items to study under this element are:

- a. Usability
- b. Condition
- c. Maintenance and repair

This should be the simplest of all elements to analyze. Every estimator should know what type and kind of equipment his company has, as well as what kind of mechanical shape it is in. If equipment is to be obtained on a rental basis then the estimator should know the agency he intends to use as to whether they will furnish good equipment and good maintenance.

Let us assume, for our example, that our company equipment is in very good shape, that we have an ample supply to draw from and that we have average mechanics. Since this is the case we estimate a productivity percentage of seventy (70).

6. **WEATHER**: Check the past weather conditions for the area in which your project is to be located. During the months that your company will be constructing, what are the weather predictions based on these past reports? Will there be much rain or snow? Will it be hot and mucky or cold and damp? The main items to check and analyze here are as follows:

- a. Past weather reports
- b. Rain or snow
- c. Hot or cold

This is one of the worst of all elements to be considered. At best all you have is a guess. However, by giving due consideration to the items as outlined under this element, your guess will at least be based on past occurrences.

For our example, let us assume that the weather is about half good and half bad during the period that our project is to be constructed. We must then assume a productivity range of fifty (50) percent for this element.

We have now considered and analyzed all six elements and in the examples for each individual element have arrived at a productivity efficiency percentage. Let us now group these percentages together and arrive at a total percentage:

Item	Productivity Percentage
1. General economy	75
2. Production supervision	70
3. Labor relations	65
4. Job Conditions	60
5. Equipment	70
6. Weather	50
	<hr/>
Total	390

Since there are six elements involved, we must now divide the total percentage by the number of elements to arrive at an average percentage of productivity.

$$390 \div 6 = 65 \text{ percent average productivity efficiency}$$

At this point we caution the estimator. This example has been included as a guide to show one method that may be used to arrive at a productivity percentage. The preceding elements can and must be considered for each individual project. By so doing, coupled with the proper manhour tables that follow, a good labor value estimate can be properly executed for any place in the world, regardless of its geographical location and whether it be today or twenty years from now.

COMPOSITE RATE

Next, we must consider the composite rate. In order to correctly arrive at a total direct labor cost, using the manhours as appear in the following tables, this must be done.

Most organizations consider field personnel with a rating of superintendent or greater as a part of job overhead, and that of general foreman or lower as direct job labor cost. The direct manhours as appear on the following pages have been determined on this basis. Therefore, a composite rate should be used when converting the manhours to direct labor dollars.

Again, the estimator must consider labor conditions in the area where the project is to be located. He must ask himself how many men will he be allowed to use in a crew, can he use crews with mixed crafts, and how many crews of the various crafts will he need.

Following is an example that may be used to obtain a composite rate:

We assume that a certain project has a certain amount of form work and that we will need four (4) eight-man crews, and that only one General Foreman will be needed to head the four crews:

Rate of Craft in the given area:

General Carpenter Foreman	\$10.64 per hour
Carpenter Foreman	10.14 per hour
Journeyman Carpenter	9.64 per hour
Laborer	6.91 per hour
Truck Driver	7.83 per hour

Note: General Foreman and Foreman are dead weight since they do not work with their tools, however, they must be considered and charged to the composite crew.

Crew for Composite Rate:

One General Foreman	2 hours @	\$10.64 =	\$ 21.28
One Foreman	8 hours @	10.14 =	81.12
Five Carpenters	8 hours @	9.64 =	385.60
Two Laborers	8 hours @	6.91 =	110.56
One Truck Driver	4 hours @	7.83 =	31.32
Total for 60 hours			\$629.88

$$\$629.88 \div 60 = \$10.498 \text{ Composite Manhour Rate for 100\% Time}$$

It is well to note at this time that, as was stated in the preface to this manual the manhours are based on an average productivity of seventy (70) percent for all Crafts with the exception of brick masons, whose average productivity is based on only fifty-five

(55) percent. Therefore, the composite rate of \$10.498, as figured above, becomes equal to seventy (70) percent productivity.

Let us now assume that we have evaluated a certain project to be bid and find it to be of a low average with an overall productivity rating of only sixty-five (65) percent. This means a loss of five (5) percent of time paid per man hour. Therefore, the composite rate should have an adjustment of five (5) percent as follows:

$$\text{\$10.498} \times 105\% = \text{\$11.02 Composite Rate for 65\% productivity.}$$

Simply by multiplying the number of manhours estimated for a given block or item of work by the arrived at composite rate, a total estimated direct labor cost, in dollar value can be easily and accurately obtained.

It is our express desire and sincere hope that the foregoing will enable the ordinary general construction estimator to turn out a better labor estimate and assist in the elimination of much guesswork.

Section 1

DEMOLITION

It is not the intent of this section to cover every conceivable type of demolition. Instead, we have covered only items which we have encountered, on various plants or projects, which had to be removed prior to the installation of new work or additions.

The following manhour tables are an average of several projects of like demolition and include only major structural items that one might have to demolish in an industrial or chemical plant.

For removal and hauling of debris, see manhour tables for hauling under Section 2 entitled "Site Grading and Structural Excavation".

Section 2

SITE-GRADING & STRUCTURAL EXCAVATION

This section is installed for the express purpose of covering the removal, and replacement, as may be necessary, of earthwork and the removal of trees and brush.

The manhour tables that follow are an average of many projects of varied nature and include operational time for site excavation and grading as well as structural foundation excavation, backfill and grading.

No emphasis has been placed on the degree of swing or depth of cut as may pertain to the efficiency rating of a piece of heavy equipment such as a power shovel, dragline, etc. As is stated above, the manhours are average for this type of work. Should a particular job of earthwork be encountered of a very difficult nature, the estimator should give this due consideration and adjust accordingly.

Before an estimate is made on excavation, it is well to know the kind of soil that may be encountered. For this reason we have divided soil into five groups according to the difficulty experienced in excavating it. Soils vary greatly in character and no two are exactly alike.

Group 1: LIGHT SOIL – Earth which can be shoveled easily and requires no loosening, such as sand.

Group 2: MEDIUM OR ORDINARY SOILS – Type of earth easily loosened by pick. Preliminary loosening is not required when power excavating equipment such as shovels, dragline scrapers and backhoes are used. This earth is usually classified as ordinary soil and loam.

Group 3: HEAVY OR HARD SOIL – This type of soil can be loosened by pick but this loosening is sometimes very hard to do. It may be excavated by sturdy power shovels without preliminary loosening. Hard and compact loam containing gravel, small stones and boulders, stiff clay or compacted gravel are good examples of this type.

Group 4: HARD PAN OR SHALE – A soil that has hardened and is very difficult to loosen with picks. Light blasting is often required when excavating with power equipment.

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Group 5: ROCK – Requires blasting before removal and transporting. May be divided into different grades such as hard, soft or medium.

Section 6

FORMWORK

This section covers labor for the complete fabrication, placing and stripping of form work for concrete structures.

Fabrication units include unloading of lumber at fabricating shop or yard, necessary labor for power saw men including pro-rata share of saw filer, fabricating of forms, transporting of fabricated forms to storage location at yard and initial oiling of forms.

Erection units include hauling of fabricated forms and miscellaneous items from yard to erection site within one thousand (1000) feet of storage yard, any field layout done solely by carpenters such as batter board installation, the erection of forms and bracing, the required carpentry clean-up prior to pouring concrete and required carpentry stand-by while concrete is being poured.

Strip and clean units include the stripping and cleaning of forms after initial concrete set, necessary site clean-up and the transporting of forms back to storage yard or new location for re-use.

Section 9

CONCRETE

It is the intent of this section to cover the complete installation of concrete in pre-erected forms and with pre-erected reinforcing steel if required.

Chuting Units include the erection of minor prefabricated wood chutes and supports. If the operation consists of chuting concrete direct from truck with attached steel chutes, carpentry manhours throughout the tables should be eliminated.

Buggy units include the moving of hand powered, three to six cubic feet buggies a distance up to two hundred (200) feet. If distance is to be greater than two hundred feet add .05 manhours for each additional fifty (50) linear feet. If power buggies are to be used instead of hand type, decrease the manhours throughout the following tables for this operation by twenty (20) percent.

Conveyor and buggy units include the transporting of concrete into a preset hopper and discharging into buggies for placement into forms, buggy portions of these units have been given due consideration as outlined above for buggy units.

Crane, bucket and buggy units include the placing of concrete from truck or mixer into a one-half to two cubic yard bucket, the raising and positioning of bucket by a crane, the discharge of concrete from bucket into a preset hopper which is to be discharged into buggies for placement into forms. Buggy portion of manhour time for this type installation is similar to that as outlined above for buggy units.

Hoist and buggy units include the hoisting of pre-mixed concrete in bulk, dumping into hopper which will discharge into buggies for transporting and dumping into forms. Manhours for buggy portion of this type operation are as outlined under buggy units. It is not the intent of the hoist units to suffice for an elevator type hoist capable of moving loaded buggies from ground to elevated areas. If this is required, additional manhours must be added for this operation.

Crane and bucket units include the placement of concrete directly into forms from one-half to two cubic yard bucket swung into position by the use of a crane.

The individual placing units as appear under this section do not include the fabrication of chutes, hoists or platforms or finishing. These items are covered under separate operational tables in this section.

Section 10

MASONRY

It is not the intent of this section to cover all types and kinds of masonry work but rather to cover those which we are familiar with in some types of industrial construction.

The following manhour and percentage tables are based on averages of several projects installed under varied conditions where strict methods and preplanning were followed and strict reporting of actual cost was recorded.

We do not attempt to say that a mason can lay any given number of brick or tile in a day. Quite contrary to this, we have found that it is not what they can lay but what they will lay. This is dependent upon the conditions and location of the individual project. Conditions are covered under the introduction to this manual and should be thoroughly understood before attempting to apply the following manhour tables. As to location, we have actually found that productivity for this type of work is better in the southern and southwestern states than in any other part of the country.

The following manhour tables cover items as may be required for this type of work in strict accordance with the preceding general notes and notes as listed on the individual manhour table pages.

GENERAL NOTES

The following notes apply to all masonry manhour tables except where noted on individual pages.

Manhours are based on continuous walls with normal amount of openings laid in common bond using full headers with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch flush cut cement mortar joints and are average for interior and exterior work where applicable.

Mixing of mortar is assumed to be by machine. If mortar is to be handmixed, add 1.9 manhours of mortar mixer time per cubic yard mixed.

If type of bond or joint is to be different than those outlined above, apply percentages as appear on page 168 for these operations.

If lime mortar is to be used instead of cement mortar, decrease mason manhours in the following tables one (1) percent.

If walls are to be cavity type, increase total manhours in the tables by the following percentages:

Cavity walls to 10 inches thick	22 percent
Cavity walls to 20 inches thick	12 percent

Manhour tables include necessary time as may be required for the machine mixing and supplying of mortar to masons, the supplying and placing of masonry units in the desired location for installation by masons, and the placement or laying of masonry units by masons.

Hoisting engineer manhours are based on use of man-operated hoist. If automatic hoist is used to place units and mortar at higher level, eliminate hoist engineer manhours and add .25 Hod carrier or helper manhour per units as listed in the following tables.

Brick table manhours are listed for various heights in ten (10) feet sections up to and including fifty (50) feet in height. For heights not shown, always use manhours for next higher listing.

If walls are to be twelve (12) feet high, use manhours for twenty (20) feet height, etc. If walls are to be higher than fifty (50) feet, increase fifty (50) feet manhours by one-half of one ($\frac{1}{2}$ of 1) percent for each additional ten (10) feet or any part thereof, up to and including one hundred (100) feet and by one (1) percent for each additional ten (10) feet or any part thereof through two hundred (200) feet.

The following manhour tables do not include unloading and hauling of masonry units to installation site, the cleaning of masonry units after installation, caulking or pointing, installation of hoist or installation of scaffolding. The items are covered on individual tables and should be given separate consideration.

Section 18

PAINTING

Painting is usually considered a specialty item throughout the construction field and as such is usually subcontracted to a contractor who specializes in this trade.

The purpose of this section is to afford the general construction estimator a good sound means or basis of estimating painting labor for industrial construction should he desire to make his own estimate or a check estimate to check his subcontractor's price.

We do not attempt to outline the method or procedure that an estimator should use in taking off this type of work. The manhour tables that follow are based on labor estimates made in accordance with the use of standard measurements used throughout the painting and decorating trades. The estimator is cautioned to be sure that he understands the various methods of measurement and measurement allowances which are used in the taking off of specialty items such as doors, sash, etc.
